The new Association launched its own newsletter – The Resident – which was, and still is circulated to all members.

Tempus Fugit. (Time Flies!)



t's hard to believe the Residents' Association was established in Billericay 90 years ago, many congratulations to all involved and long may your good work for the Town continue.

I remember writing my first article for the "Resident" it was about State pensions and set out how to obtain a State Pension Forecast, which took about a month and was paper-based at that time. This has not changed, we still ask folk to get a forecast, it's an essential part of planning, but it's now online and almost instant.

The Independent Financial Advice Centre was established in Billericay by Mike Joslin in February 1988 and he kindly invited me to join him in 1990, which is a staggering 26 years we have spent together trying to help Residents of the town with their investments and pensions. There are supposed to be two certainties in life; Death and Taxes, but I would add a third Change. No sooner do we think we've got to grips with something when the rules change and we start again.

House

I'm not sure who came up with the "strap line" on our door "Making sense of a complicated world" but it sums up in a nutshell what we try to do.

The door has changed a few times from 22 to 39 and for the last seven years 97 but the High Street has always been our home and long may it continue. We have been next to Amber's Beauty Salon, above the Co-op which changed to the Blue Boar, and now above Santander.

Acronyms change as well, in the 90s our regulator was FIMBRA (Financial Intermediaries, Managers and Brokers Regulatory Association) which became the PIA (Personal Investment Authority) which became the FSA the Financial Services Authority which became the FCA the Financial Conduct Authority. All that regulation and people still lose millions of pounds to crooks, makes one wonder what they achieve.

As far as complications are concerned, there is no doubt the world is even more complex than it was in the 90s and noughties. Current changes to Pension Schemes, ISAs, income Tax, Capital gains tax, tax on dividends and many other changes keep us very busy.

Today we have a younger generation of Independent Financial Advisers working in the Advice Centre. They have higher qualifications then we ever needed to enable them to continue dealing with changes in an ever more complex financial world.

Consequently an election committee was formed to contest the Billericay Ward and at a second attempt the first RA councillor was elected to District Council in May 1961. Further successes followed with four more RA candidates being elected in consecutive elections.

been elected to the District Council.





Probably the highlight of the Association's life occurred in 1979 when its candidates on the District Council elections won all nine seats and thus held the balance of power in the Council Chambers, for three years, and the offices of Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Council during that period.

In addition it was represented in the County Council in Chelmsford. There are no longer Councillors in either District or County Councils. Essex County Council



1997

A group of Billericay people, including BDRA, formed a Steering Committee which ran the successful campaign for the creation of Billericay Town Council and the nearby parish councils. In 1997 the new parishes of Billericay, Great Burstead & South Green, Little Burstead, Ramsden Crays and Ramsden Bellhouse were established.

Some Issues



Queens Park

The plan for the development of Queens Park was published in 1967. It was the biggest development ever to be undertaken in Billericay, covering an area of some 148 acres of the plotland estate known as Queens Park, Mill Hill and Mill Hill Wood. Woodlands and scrub



covered much of the area which was largely wasted and lost to agriculture, lacking in public services and fronting unmade roads.

At the time we had 2 RA candidates on the District Council. They, well briefed on members' feelings in the Area Committees, kept a close watch on the original proposals and the numerous revisions.

On 8 March 1974 an agreement was signed by Basildon Urban District Council and the Queens Park Consortium Ltd which contained proposals regarding, amongst other things, the exchange of land, planning permission for housing, building of roads and roundabouts, provision of recreational facilities including a Country Park, all of which were carefully monitored by the Associations' councillors.

Green Belt

The policy of the Residents' Association has been consistently against development in the Green Belt. Thus a continuous watch is kept on planning applications which are submitted for development within the Green Belt, and also within the town, especially in the High Street Conservation Area.

In places where planning applications were refused by the Council and subsequently where the applicants appealed against that decision the Residents' Association was represented at the inquiries concerning all major developments. Examples include: 80 acres at Southend Road, land at Norsey Meadows, Outwood Farm Road, Mountnessing Road, Hannakins Farm, not forgetting land north and west of Norsey View Drive.

Celebrating our Green Spaces



In 1966 an application to build 32 houses was staunchly opposed and then in 1976 Basildon Council compulsory purchased Norsey Woods following another Public Inquiry held on 9 April 1975.

The Council had the support of a number of organisations in the town, not least the Residents' Associations who again were

represented at the Inquiry. Probably the most important item of evidence produced for the Inspectors consideration on the last afternoon of the Inquiry was correspondence from the Clerk of the Essex County Council to the Secretary of the Billericay Residents' Association dated 14 January 1966. This showed that it was the intention of the County Council to ask the Minister of State for the Environment to amend the County Development Plan by changing Norsey Wood from Metropolitan Green Belt to Public Open Space, an extremely important factor in obtaining the favourable decision required for the compulsory purchase to go forward, thus saving the Wood from development for all time.

Mill Meadows Local Nature Reserve

is about 38 hectares (90 acres) in size, and one of the finest ancient meadow systems in Essex. The site was formerly farmland, and much of it has been undisturbed by ploughing and fertilization for many years creating the ideal conditions for a wonderful diversity of wild flowers, fungi, insects and invertebrates, many of which are rare. It contains an area of about 7 hectares (17 acres) declared as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) for its unimproved neutral grassland. This grassland type is very much reduced within the Essex landscape, due to development and agricultural improvement.

The site is important for its species-rich wild flower meadows and its range of waxcap fungi for which it is a site of regional importance. In addition the site is well used by local bird populations and foraging bats.



Mill Meadows is grazed by a herd of Red Poll cattle. Grazing is a traditional method of grassland management that enables meadows like these to be kept low in nutrients (these being transferred into the cattle), so that threatened and attractive wild



flowers are not outcompeted by some of the more vigorous grass species.

Mill Meadows is managed by Basildon Council Parks and Countryside with the support of the Mill Meadows Society. There are two marked trails around the reserve, starting at entrances at Chapel Street and Greens Farm. There is no car park at the site, so it is best to use the town centre car parks, as parking restrictions apply to the residential streets around Mill Meadows.



Lake Meadows... The Jewel in the Crown

ake Meadows, known as the 'Jewel in the Crown' of Billericay, attracts hundreds of visitors each week, who enjoy the peaceful surroundings and different features of the park.

Although the original farmland was owned by the Spitty family for most of the 19th century, it was Billericay Urban District Council, under Chairman Henry E Bebington, who had the amazing foresight to buy the land in 1935 for just \pounds 1,400 (about \pounds 90K in today's terms). Within a year, 'the Moat', as it had previously been known, became Lake Meadows and was officially opened on Saturday July 11th 1936.

Over the years, various facilities were added, including an outdoor swimming pool dug by hand by volunteers, a children's paddling pool, the café and boats on the lake,

manned by the boat keeper Alec Taylor. In 1955, the management of the park became the responsibility of Basildon Council and a team of park keepers took over, led by Reg King who worked in the park for over 35 years, planting many of the trees and planning the design of the annual raised bed.

In the winter of 1966, the lake was drained for extensive remedial work, to reinforce the lake base and strengthen the western bank, with an added sluice. It was at this time that the Fort, an old boathouse at the head of the lake, where the Garden of the Child now sits, was demolished.

Now, the Friends of Lake Meadows have stepped in to help maintain the park and provide new features, all of which will ensure that the park continues to grow and develop as a green space, providing a calm oasis for Billericay residents to relax in and enjoy.

Railway Bridge

Because the railway bridge is badly in need of being repainted we have found out that responsibility lies with Basildon Council, but as yet they have not responded to our request to repaint. We will discuss this at our next meeting in July.

Elizabeth Cottage

At a meeting on 15th June Basildon Council explained their proposed way forward for Elizabeth Cottage. It is currently under a 3 month notice period for payment of debt incurred by BDC. This will finish on 18th July. If the debt has not been paid a charge will be applied at the land registry. The council will then have the power to sell the property to get their payment.

The cottage will then be sold at auction and any surplus will be kept in a trust account for 12 years so the owners will have that time in which to claim their money. The BDRA are pleased to see that some action is being taken and whoever buys the property will need to gain planning permission for the site.

Speeding

There is a town wide problem with speeding on our roads, of particular note are Greens Farm Lane, Perry Street and Stock Road where the presence of nurseries, schools and/or old peoples schemes make speeding an increased issue. The committee discussed this and we would like to know our members thoughts. particularly on whether we should campaign for speed cameras instead of vehicle activated signs.

Bus timetables

Since the bus service changes came into force on 10th April

the timetables at the bus stops have not been updated. In some cases helpful locals have stuck new timetables up. We will write to Essex County Council Passenger Transportation to request that new timetables are placed at all the bus stops. If anyone notices that this has been done we would like to know.

Time Capsule

As part of our 90th anniversary a Time Capsule has been commissioned and will be filled with the hopes and fears for Billericay that we have been sent (it's not too late to add your hopes and fears). On 30th September John Baron MP will seal our Time Capsule at a specially organised meeting in The Reading Rooms to which we will soon be sending out invitations.

Future of BDRA

A document on our vision and strategy has been produced and this will be discussed at our next executive meeting. This will include discussing our mission statement (what we do) and our vision statement (our long term vision of our future) as well as analysing our current membership so that we can see where the streets are with no members and can then target these streets to increase our numbers.
