Correction

n the November issue it was inferred that the BDRA was responsible in securing Queen Elizabeth II Playing Field status for Sun Corner thus ensuring that the area would remain free from any building development.

We have subsequently been advised by the Town Council that it was solely responsible for this achievement their entering into a partnership with Essex County Council and Basildon County Council in pursuance of their aims. However, we have subsequently been advised that the Billericay Society was significantly involved in the saving of Sun Corner and an item by David Bremer, former Chairman of the Society, will be included in a future issue of the Resident which will highlight the Society's role regarding the saving of Sun Corner in which it first became involved in 1978.

We have also seen a planning application for a 76 room care home on Coxes Farm Road approved by local councillors despite it also being Green Belt land. We believe this is a bad decision and have asked the Leader of the Council to consider getting the application called-in for independent consideration. There are planning applications for another three care homes in Billericay, all in the Green Belt, so a worry is that a precedent may have already been set.

There are clear signs that the Green Belt is under threat. We are seeing inconsistencies in the council's planning officers recommendations, planning committee decisions, and how appeals are determined. To be blunt it's a mess, highlighting issues with the planning system both locally and nationally.

We continue to contest that the future of the Green Belt should be determined through the Local Plan process, proper public consultation and independent examination, not through ad hoc speculative planning applications as we are seeing now. That said, we strongly believe that the borough can meet its real evidence based housing need without using any of the existing Green Belt.

Our councillors need to take control of the situation now to stop huge development right across our Green Belt before the new Local Plan is adopted.

Lake Meadows history

I was pleased to read that Brian Hughes had obviously enjoyed the article about Lake Meadows in your October edition and it had rekindled memories of his childhood.

It is interesting to note that there are a number of old photographs of the outdoor swimming pool in existence, that very clearly show the high diving board, the concrete base of which remains in the local garden, where some of the pool still remains.

A deed dated Aug 8th 1935, details that the bulk of the farmland was purchased from Olive Elizabeth Connelly for £1,400 by the Council. Further pockets of land were gradually added during following years. On July 11th, 1936, the park was officially opened by Councillor Matthew Land. Olive Connelly was the daughter of John Spurling, a wealthy wharfinger, who built and lived in Lake View (attached to Hill House) in the 1920s. He gave Hill House farmhouse to his daughter for a wedding present, when she married Reginald John Connelly, the well-known writer of lyrics of popular songs, including 'Goodnight Sweetheart'. Olive sold both houses, the gardens and orchard to William Cater and his wife the same year.

Siblings and inheritance tax

Do you love your sister, brother, and half-siblings enough to live with them and pass your estate to them? If so, then a new Bill is being proposed that may help you delay inheritance tax and plan to save inheritance tax.

With the family dynamic changing across the UK with recognition of blended families, cohabitees, stepfamilies, and the unforeseeable changes in a world that is changing socially at a rapid pace, it is more likely that siblings are multi-generational.

What is the new siblings and inheritance tax?

The proposal is to allow siblings or half-siblings who live together for a period of not less than 7 years prior to the first death to give their estate to the surviving sibling free of Inheritance Tax.

There have been a few highprofile cases recently involving siblings living together in an inherited family home and not having enough funds to pay the Inheritance Tax.

There was an argument that if they were a more distant relation, they would be able to enter a marriage or civil partnership which would provide them with the ability to pass their estate to their spouse/civil partner free of Inheritance Tax.

There are few restrictions on who you can or cannot marry, but under English Law, you cannot marry a child, parent, grandparent or grandchild, siblings and half-siblings, and your parent's siblings/half siblings or their children.

of the Woods' and 'Dog Stinkhorn'. A full list has been published on our website for the serious fungus fans.

New pathway for Mill for Mill Meadows

Basildon Borough Council have appointed H&B Groundwork Contractors Ltd to hard surface the path between the entrance to the Mill Meadows Local Nature Reserve on Chaffinch Crescent to the pedestrian access points on the Southend Road.

This path runs east west across the Local Nature Reserve through the fields called Hurlocks, Hilly Field, Coles and Wantsfield. You can see the route of this path on the Mill Meadows map on the Visit page.

The hard surfacing will hopefully make the path easier to use, particularly during the winter months.

In addition, a new field gate is

being installed between the fields Cumborrow and Hilly Field near the Millennium Bridge. The brook will be piped at this point and spare soil from the path works will enable a vehicle bridge for maintenance vehicles to be constructed.

Billericay Tree Wardens (BTW)

Developer – **Spare that Tree!** are felled prior to a Planning

ur mature trees throughout Billericay are as a "Green Lung" for the town, exchanging air pollution for oxygen and thus reducing respiratory problems and providing shade in hot summers.

Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs) are mainly enacted on trees that are considered to be under a "perceived threat" and can (surprisingly) cost a Local Authority thousands of pounds in searches and legal fees to implement. So understandably, our Local Authority probably only TPOs two or three trees per month across the entire 45 sq miles of our borough.

Trees on BBC land and ECC highways land (verges), Conservation Areas, Nature Reserves and Parks are also legally protected and is a very good basis for our tree stock to safely go into the future. However, non-TPO trees in a private garden can be felled without Local Authority permission; reflecting the lawful rights of a property owner.

The rejuvenation and replacement of rundown properties is

good for generally the community, business and employment. What the Billericay Tree Wardens (BTW) consider needs to be addressed are the actions of those gap-site Developers who once they own a property, more often than not clear-fell all non-TPO trees and replace the existing structure with a more substantial building. Paying little regards for trees that could have been retained and unconcerned about existing trees that had added a "Street Scene" amenity value for the local community. In our experience, the neighbouring properties to gap-site developments can lead to border problems and short thrift from the Developer. However, although these actions may be seen as questionable, they are not unlawful.

But where an anomaly occurs is the "grey area" whereby trees

Application (PA) being submitted or when submitted is Refused; by which time several c.250 year old oaks have been unnecessarily felled. In the BTW's view, no trees should be felled until the PA is Approved and only then when a discussion has followed between the Local Authority and the Developer to agree on which trees can be removed and those that should be retained. To achieve this end, it would probably require a local Authority to revise its Planning regulations or for a "Private Members Bill" to be presented in Parliament. Our proactively environmentally aware Town Councillor has endorsed this view for we need to safeguard the greenness about us.

This article has been written on behalf of those residents that we have in the town who are the "natural guardians" of their local trees and ring alarm bells should a threat occur.

The BTW is a subgroup of the Billericay Town Council.
