N o details of the next iteration of the Local Plan have been made public since the last version was withdrawn back in March. However, all the signs are that we will see something at the meeting of the Cabinet on 8th September; around the time you will be reading this. are taking right and proper time to formulate the next Local Plan.

In the meantime it's good to see the council using the existing and still active Local Plan to decide planning matters. Most specifically rejecting two planning applications on the Green Belt for sites that were being proposed in the now withdrawn update to the Local Plan. These being Maitland Lodge on Southend Road for 42 dwellings and land north of Kennel Lane for 200 houses. Both these planning applications are subject to appeals from the developers so we are not quite out of the woods yet but it's good to see the council making their position very clear and standing by their own policies. The results of appeals the will be known this autumn.

Radford Way Development

We are often asked about the building site at the corner of Radford Way and Stock Road as for many residents the site has become an eyesore. The BDRA has contacted Basildon Council several times and both the Land Agent and the developer.

Planning Application for a ground floor shop, 2 flats above and parking underneath at the site was granted in February 2017. Once granted some work must take place within 3 years or an approval is withdrawn and whilst some initial activity did take place at the site, it is not believed that any substantive

work has taken place since then. Although we understand the developer has been beset by a range of issues not immediately within his control, Councils do not have the powers to force developers to take residents concerns into account whilst these are addressed. It is of little comfort to Billericay residents that this so visible eyesore is not unique in the Borough.

Unfortunately for residents, the Government has tipped the balance firmly to the benefit of developers and builders in a wide range of areas and seems to do little, if anything, to protect us from the less desirable activities of builders,



discouraging Councils from taking any punitive action against them and effectively neutering any powers councils, and residents, might expect. Whilst Council officers may be sympathetic they are constrained by the rules they have available. Often developers are only following what to them is usual practice whilst residents may well have an entirely different interpretation of the situation.

We will continue to liaise with the developer of this site in an effort to improve the visual amenity until the construction work begins, and encourage a swift completion period. In the short term they have promised some covering for the fencing to improve the look of the site.

ow recklessly the English discard their country's unique traditions; yet Morris dancing has a long history in our town (from at least 1575) and we are determined to see it continue. Our pre-covid attempt to start a Mayflower Morris Men boys' side in Billericay was scuppered by the lockdowns. 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Letters...

Our "Letters" page last month on the subject of KFC litter really hit a note with our readers. Here's an update on our progress to date and some more of your thoughts.

We have contacted CIIr Shrader who has been very supportive. The following correspondence demonstrates his ongoing attention:



"This is a matter I already raised with officers back in May and they arranged to increase the number of cleansing patrols. That seemed to alleviate the issues for a while but I can see problems persist, as I knew they would (I voted against KFC's planning application at committee for precisely this reason).

Officers were also reviewing the number of bins in and around the High Street and making recommendations as to whether the current provision is appropriate. By copy, I shall ask my colleague, Councillor Blake, the Cabinet Member for Environment, to

Chase with up. Officers were also going to make direct contact with KFC and other local food businesses (including Greggs) around their corporate social responsibility commitments towards the area. I cannot remember the exact details of the planning condition corporate social responsibility commitments towards the area. I cannot remember the exact details of the planning condition you refer to (as I say, I voted against it anyway) but I do recall that KFC's application included reference to regular litterpicks. I am not sure of the exact area they are obligated to but, as I said at the time, we all know that a great deal of their product will be taken elsewhere, particularly Sun Corner, and not disposed of properly"



"Further to my last email, officers have confirmed that they have been monitoring the litter issues around KFC and have also spoken to the Store Manager, who confirmed they send out litter-pickers during the day.

I have also spoken to the Council's cleansing department, who will be emptying the bins near Gregg's more frequently (where it has been noted they are often full by lunchtime). Officers are also making enquiries into additional litter bins near to the KFC, as there is not presently on in close proximity"

"Just by way of further update, officers advise me they have had a conversation with the KFC area manager, Mr. Ahmed, who has informed us that they have a bin on order, which will be positioned outside their premises"

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Do you have outbuildings at your home? – How do you ensure you are fully covered?

For many of us garages and outbuildings are extensions of our homes used in some cases as additional rooms to make space in the house.

However, many standard house insurance policies will only offer restricted cover for items kept in outbuildings, often limited to $\pounds5,000$ or lower with single article limits of below $\pounds1,000$. 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New trust registration rules – what you need to know

The Trust Registration Service (TRS) is a register of the beneficial ownership of trusts. In 2017, the TRS was set up as part of an EU anti-money laundering directive aimed at combating money laundering. All UK express trusts liable to pay UK tax were required to register.

New rules came into force in October 2020. These require registration of all UK trusts (and some non-UK trusts) in existence on or after 6th October 2020, including those not liable to tax, unless specifically excluded, even where they have since closed.

What Trusts are excluded?

Pension schemes, charitable trusts, will trusts wound up within two years of death, policy trusts paying out on death or critical illness, and existing trusts with a value of less than £100 created prior to 6gth October 2020. There are further exclusions, a full list has been published by HMRC.

What are the deadlines?

Non-taxable trusts in existence on or after 6 October 2020 must be registered by

1 September 2022 (even if they are now closed). Non-taxable trusts created anytime from 90 days before 1 September 2022 must be registered within 90 days of creation.

Registering a Trust

Trustees are responsible for ensuring trusts are registered. Trustees can appoint a lead trustee to do this or an agent, such as Birkett Long Solicitors. The trustees are required to maintain accurate, up-to-date trust records and are obliged to keep the register updated each year or on certain specific events occurring. HMRC may impose penalties and fines for non-compliance.

The data on TRS is only available to those who have a legitimate interest. HMRC can refuse access where there is a disproportionate risk of exposing the beneficial owner for example to fraud, blackmail, or intimidation.

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hildhood summer holidays are often remembered as long sunny days, although rain did often occur too! The recent long, hot spell has been glorious in many ways, with perfect, cloudless, blue skies, but our lovely park is looking very brown and is desperate for rain. Hopefully the birds and some insects have found water to drink in the lake and have been able to keep cool.

In the 1920s, a group of local swimming enthusiasts had swum in the lake at Lake Meadows for some years, until, for safety reasons, this was banned. As a result, some of them decided to build themselves an outdoor swimming pool. So, the Billericay Swimming and Social Club was formed on July 24th 931 and a piece of land was bought from Ricketts Farm for £150, near to the present cricket pavilion in the park.

In the following year, a group of local enthusiasts started work on the swimming pool. With little experience but much enthusiasm, the group dug out the pool by hand, puddling the clay with their bare feet. The team worked for the best part of a year to complete it at no further cost other than for the land and materials for the changing rooms, equipment hut and the high diving board.

They were a very happy band of people – the planners, the engineers, the carpenters, the puddlers and the tea makers. People gave their time, money and great energy as they worked and slaved through wet winter weekends in mud up to our knees. It was a large pool, measuring 150 yards long by 60 yards wide, and 15ft deep; it was fed by water from the overflow from the lake. It took a year to build and was then open from 9am to sunset, every day of the week. water polo and life-saving featured and many trophies won. It was affiliated to various swimming associations and the Royal Life-Saving Society.



The pool was officially opened by Brigadier General R.B. Colvin C.B., Lord Lieutenant of Essex, on June 11th, 1932 and it continued to thrive for the next twenty years or so.

Edward 'Tammy' Temme, who had gained fame as the first swimmer to swim the English Channel in both directions, visited the pool the following year and gave a swimming demonstration at the annual gala. The pool was in regular use throughout the year, with Sadly, he pool had to close on June 1st 1959, due to the water supply failing and lack of volunteers. The Senior Sanitary Inspector said that it was 'unsuitable for swimming bath purposes'. The decision was made to fill in the swimming pool and it became a happy memory.

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Sanctuary Given to the Two Vandalised Pilgrim 400 Trees

The Billericay Town Council had funded two specially cultivated Bramley apple trees for the 400th commemorative sailing of the Pilgrim Fathers to America from Plymouth. Sadly they were twice vandalised; so we took them into care and a little wooden splint, some glue and a rubber band did the trick!



We requested that the Great Burstead Church give the trees sanctuary in their church grounds. The link being that Christopher Martin, the Church Warden back in 1620, sailed as a Pilgrim Father on the Mayflower, and they were finally planted in the church grounds on Saturday 14th May 2022. Two volunteers will regularly water the trees until they are established and we hope to install a plaque commemorating the event. Thanks to the Reverend Michael Hall for making this possible. It had not escaped our attention that the Pilgrim Fathers and the trees both had a difficult journey!

Tree Loss at Norsey Wood Update

Www.e still wait news from the BBC Enforcement as to whether or not the law was broken when the trees were felled in a garden that extends down to Norsey Wood's Main Ride.



The trees were part of the ancient woodland and were on Green Belt. It has since been established that the land is legally owned by the Norsey Road property owner but we understand that a "condition" included within the Planning Application for the Norsey Road site requires a landscaping scheme to be approved by the BBC before the owner is allowed to move into his new home.

Norsey Wood is one of the Borough's top amenity sites and is a very well managed Local Nature Reserve with the designation as a Site of Special Scientific Interest. Basildon Borough Council and the Norsey Wood Society work in partnership to manage the Wood, and tree loss such as this, whether legal or illegal, has had a negative impact.

We understand that the BBC Tree Officers have surveyed the 2.5 acres of ancient woodland on the other three or four gardens that extend down to the Main Ride with a view to designate them a Group Woodland TPO.
